## From the Principal's Desk:

Dear Whitehall Middle School Families,

I hope this message finds you well as we move into the final stretch of the school year. As always, thank you for your continued support of our students, staff, and schools. Today, I would like to share some vital information about an upcoming vote that directly impacts the future of Whitehall District Schools.

On Tuesday, May 6th, Whitehall residents will have the opportunity to vote on the WDS operating millage. We want to be sure that everyone has the correct information.

Here are the key points:

-If this proposal is not approved, WDS could lose about \$4.17 million in funding for the 2026 tax year.

-This is not a new or additional tax.

-ALL districts in Michigan are required to levy an operating millage.

-This only applies to non-homestead properties such as businesses, second homes, rental properties, and other investment properties.

-The request for 20 mills is a protection. State law only allows us to collect 18 mills, but the additional 2 mills provide protection against future Headlee reductions, as we experienced in 2024.

-This millage accounts for approximately 13% of our annual operating budget

### 6<sup>th</sup> Grade News:

Math - Our 6th graders will be taking the math M-STEP on Tuesday, May 6th in the morning classes. Please be sure to have your child arrive at school on time with a good night's rest and a healthy breakfast. We will ask students to leave their chromebooks at school on Monday to be sure they are charged and ready for the testing session.

**Geography** - Geography students are learning about the cultures and countries of North and South America. They continue to practice their map skills through a variety of activities.

**Science** - We are finishing our study of shadows and seasons. There will be a quiz next week.

**English-** Students successfully completed their 6th grade ELA MSTEP this past week. We would like to commend them on their best efforts and perseverance. We continue to read informational text, analyzing author's point of view, word connotation, author's purpose, and central idea. These studies have been focused on the great space race and its impact on our nation.

### 7<sup>th</sup> Grade News:

**Science:** Mr. Huizenga's Science Classes will finish the year studying Ecology. We'll cover Ecosystems, Symbiotic Relationships, and Predators vs. Prey in the next few weeks.

**ELA:** The ELA classes continue to work through figurative language and poetry as well as the final module which uses plastic pollution as a topic. The students will be evaluating claims and evidence throughout the module. The culminating project will be a short documentary on the issues with plastic in our environment.

**Math:** Math classes continue to work on Unit 6, Equations and Inequalities. We will have an assessment next week on solving multiple step equations. We will begin to focus on writing and solving inequalities after the quiz. This week we will be completing the math MStep on Thursday, May 8th.

## 8<sup>th</sup> Grade News:

### ELA:

We have started a new novel study of Farewell to Manzanar. This novel focuses on the Japanese Internment Camps created during World War II. Students are working on understanding and comprehending distinctions and connections between characters, settings, and plot lines.

### Math 8:

Math 8 students have begun Unit 7 Exponents and Scientific Notation.

### Algebra:

In Algebra, students finished unit 7 this week and have begun unit 8 on Quadratic equations. We will be solving quadratic equations for the rest of the year.

## U.S. History:

This week we will complete a State Report.

## Science:

Students collected water samples in both Whitehall and Montague in the tributaries that lead into White Lake. They tested them for Nitrates, PH, Phosphates, bacteria and other parameters. Then they presented their findings to the class

They are learning how to chart their data, compare results and make inferences from their field site analysis.

**History:** The students in History Class will be studying Athens and Sparta as part of our Ancient Studies Unit. We will be looking at government, economics and the values of the two city-states.
